### APPROVAL OF THE GUAM TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FY 2020 – FY 2023

WHEREAS, the Stewardship Agreement between the Federal Highway Administration — Hawaii Federal-aid Division and the Government of Guam, executed on August 11, 2014 included a provision that the Government of Guam will develop a Guam Transportation Improvement Program (GTIP) and that the FHWA will review and approve the GTIP; and

WHEREAS, the Guam Transportation Improvement Program is developed for a period of no less than four years and amended as needed any time after the effective date of the GTIP under direction of the Government of Guam Department of Public Works; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Guam has directed the Department of Public Works to meet U.S. Department of Transportation planning requirements; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Public Works through the conduct of a continuing, comprehensive and coordinated transportation planning process carried out in conjunction with the Government of Guam has prepared a Guam Transportation Improvement Program; and

WHEREAS, the Government of Guam Department of Public Works finds that this Guam Transportation Improvement Program has been prepared through a process of agency coordination and in accordance with required public participation procedures.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Government of Guam Department of Public Works does hereby approve the Guam Transportation Improvement Program for FY 2020 - 2023.

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### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Government of Guam Department of Public Works (DPW) developed the Transportation Improvement Program (GTIP) for the federal fiscal years 2020-2023. The GTIP was prepared in accordance with the requirements of Sections 1115 of Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act (P.L.No. 114-94), in order to provide a list of transportation improvement projects for implementation. This GTIP provides a near-term improvement plan that is financially feasible, fiscally constrained, and reflects the highway projects that the DPW prioritizes for the expenditure of federal funds for the noted fiscal period.

This GTIP is adjunct to the 2030 Guam Transportation Plan (GTP), Guam's long range (20+ year) multi modal transportation strategy and follows previous GTIP documents. The 2030 GTP was finalized December 2008 and presented a long-term strategy to improve transportation throughout Guam. The plan forecasted traffic growth through the year 2030 and included impacts associated with the potential U.S. Department of defense (USDOD) build-up as it was understood at the time the 2030 GTP was produced. Since then the military buildup planned for Guam has been reduced. To capture this change in traffic forecast and to document an analysis of traffic safety on Guam, the 2019 Traffic Safety and Operation Study (TSOS) has been developed. The TSOS supplements the 2030 GTP.

Projects in the GTIP were developed through a comprehensive transportation planning process and based on data collected through the Pavement Management System, results from the Bridge Inspection Reports, needs identified in the 2030 Guam Transportation Plan, and commitments from prior GTIP documents. The list of projects is a product of a consensus building process with decision-making supported by data driven analysis that was carried out by the DPW in cooperation with local villages, utility providers, the local government agencies and Federal government agencies.

Projects contained in the GTIP FY2020-2023 were selected to address safety issues, including issues from flooding on Guam's roadway system, pavement and bridge conditions, and provide traffic operational improvements. Funding for Guam transportation projects will come from several sources, but largely from the federal National Highway System (NHS).

A summary of the funds anticipated to be available to DPW for transportation projects over the fouryear life of the GTIP is as follows:

### INTRODUCTION

### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this document is to inform the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the public, and other interested parties that the Government of Guam Department of Public Works (DPW) has met the requirements of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act for the development of the Guam Transportation Improvement Program (GTIP).

This document provides a Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) that is financially feasible, fiscally constrained and depicts DPW's priorities for the expenditure of federal funds for fiscal years 2020-2023.

#### TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

In order to plan for and implement transportation improvement projects, the DPW produces two major work products: the Guam Transportation Plan and the Guam Transportation Improvement Program.

### **GUAM TRANSPORTATION PLAN (GTP)**

The GTP is a long range (20+ year) multimodal transportation strategy and capital improvement program developed to guide the effective investment of public funds in transportation facilities for a variety of purposes including:

- 1) To help manage traffic congestion,
- 2) To provide a comprehensive transportation system for residents, workers and visitors, and
- 3) To increase modes of travel.

DPW's current Transportation Plan was adopted in 2008 and extends through the year 2030.

#### GUAM TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (GTIP)

The GTIP is a four-year plan that lists federally funded projects and transportation services on Guam, including highway and street projects, bridge projects, and bicycle/pedestrian enhancement projects.

The projects identified in the long range 2030 GTP provide the basis for selection and prioritization of projects in the GTIP. Projects are required to be included in the 2030 GTP before they can be programmed (funded) in the GTIP. The GTIP establishes the list of projects in a given fiscal period that have been deemed to be the highest priority and feasibly implemented. The GTIP is a budgeting document that indicates which projects will be implemented in the current four-year period.

### GTIP DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

### **OVERVIEW**

The GTIP was developed by the Government of Guam DPW, in consultation with the FHWA and includes input from the public.

The GTIP consists of a priority list of highway projects, which are being advanced toward implementation over the four-year period from Federal Fiscal Year 2020 to Federal Fiscal Year 2023. Projects in the GTIP have been developed through the transportation planning process and are drawn from the 2030 GTP, which is being amended with the 2019 Traffic Safety and Operations Study. Projects have also been drawn from the Pavement Management System findings and Bridge Inspection and Load Rating Reports.

Projects contained in the FY2020-2023 GTIP address safety, pavement and bridge conditions, and traffic operations.

### **FUNDING SOURCES**

Funding for Guam transportation projects comes primarily from federal funding through the National Highway System (NHS).

The table below provides a summary of the funding that DPW expects to receive over the four-year life of the GTIP.

#### NATIONAL HIGHWAY SYSTEM

The National Highway System (NHS) was created by Section 112 of the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1970 (Public Law 91-605) by adding Section 215 to Title 23, United States Code (U.S.C.). Federal financial assistance was granted to the Virgin Islands, Guam, Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands and American Samoa for the construction and improvement of a system of arterial highways and necessary interisland connectors through the General Fund of the Treasury. Under 23 U.S.C. 215(b)(1), the intent of the NHS is to assist each territory in the construction and improvement of a system of arterial and collector highways, and necessary inter-island connectors. This system is referred to as the National Highway System (NHS).

The primary source of funding for GTIP projects is Federal money received by Guam through the NHS. The FHWA provides funds for Guam through the most current federal transportation authorization, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act (P.L.No. 114-94). The FAST Act reaffirmed the mutual benefits that will accrue to the territories and the United States from the improvement of highways in the territories. Additionally, it authorizes the Secretary of Transportation to carry out a program to assist each territory in the construction and improvement of a system of arterial and collector highways and necessary inter-island connectors. [Title 23, U.S.C., Section 165(c)(2)(A)]. Sections 1115 of the FAST Act provide funds for the NHS under 23 U.S.C. 165(a)(2) for Fiscal Years 2016 through 2020. These funds provide contract authority authorized from the Highway Trust Fund.

Although the FAST Act expires at the end of FY 2020, this GTIP has been prepared under the assumption that the total amount of Federal funds authorized to Guam under the FAST Act will stay constant for the following three Federal Fiscal years (FY 2021-2023).

### FEDERAL SHARE

Under 23 U.S.C. 215(b)(2), the Federal share for this NHS funding is in accordance with 23 U.S.C. 120(h), which states that the Federal share for any project under Title 23 in the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, or the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands is 100 percent.

### **PROJECT SELECTION**

Projects are selected to be placed on the GTIP based on three main factors:

- Condition and need
- Source of funds
- Availability of funds

The majority of the funds for the GTIP come from the National Highway System (NHS) which is dispersed to Guam in four equal amounts throughout the life of the GTIP. Consequently, in addition to the environmental, property, traffic and community impact issues, the majority of the projects selected are based on condition, need and the availability of funds from FHWA.

### **ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES**

The eligible projects and activities for which funds made available for the NHS may be used are listed in 23 U.S.C. 215(f)(1) as follows:

- A) Eligible surface transportation program (STP) projects described in 23 U.S.C. 133(b), which is included in appendix C of this guidance;
- B) Cost-effective, preventive maintenance consistent with 23 U.S.C. 116(d);
- C) Ferry boats, terminal facilities, and approaches, in accordance with 23 U.S.C. 129(b) and (c);
- D) Engineering and economic surveys and investigations for the planning and the financing of future highway programs;
- E) Studies of the economy, safety, and convenience of highway use;
- F) Regulation and equitable taxation of highway use; and,
- G) Research and development necessary for the planning, design, and maintenance of the highway system.

Under the provisions of 23 U.S.C. 215(g), NHS shall not be used on roads functionally classified as local, with the following exceptions:

- Construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, resurfacing, restoration, and operational improvements on bridges, as indicated in 23 U.S.C. 133(b)(1);
- Carpool, bicycle, and pedestrian projects, as indicated in 23 U.S.C. 133(b)(3); and,
- Highway and transit safety projects and programs, as indicated in 23 U.S.C. 133(b)(4).

Under the provisions of 23 U.S.C. 215(f)(2), NHS funds shall not be obligated or expended for routine maintenance.

### **FINANCIAL PLAN**

### **OVERVIEW**

The projects contained in the GTIP are derived from the 2030 Guam Transportation Plan including the 2019 Traffic Safety and Operation Study amendment, Pavement Management System, Bridge Inspection Reports, commitments from prior GTIP documents and were selected based on condition/need, source of funds and availability of funds. Timing of each project is contingent upon the availability of funds for any given fiscal year.

The tables on the following pages represent the Guam DPW's priorities and implementation plan for the expenditure of federal funds for the Federal Fiscal years 2020 - 2023.


